

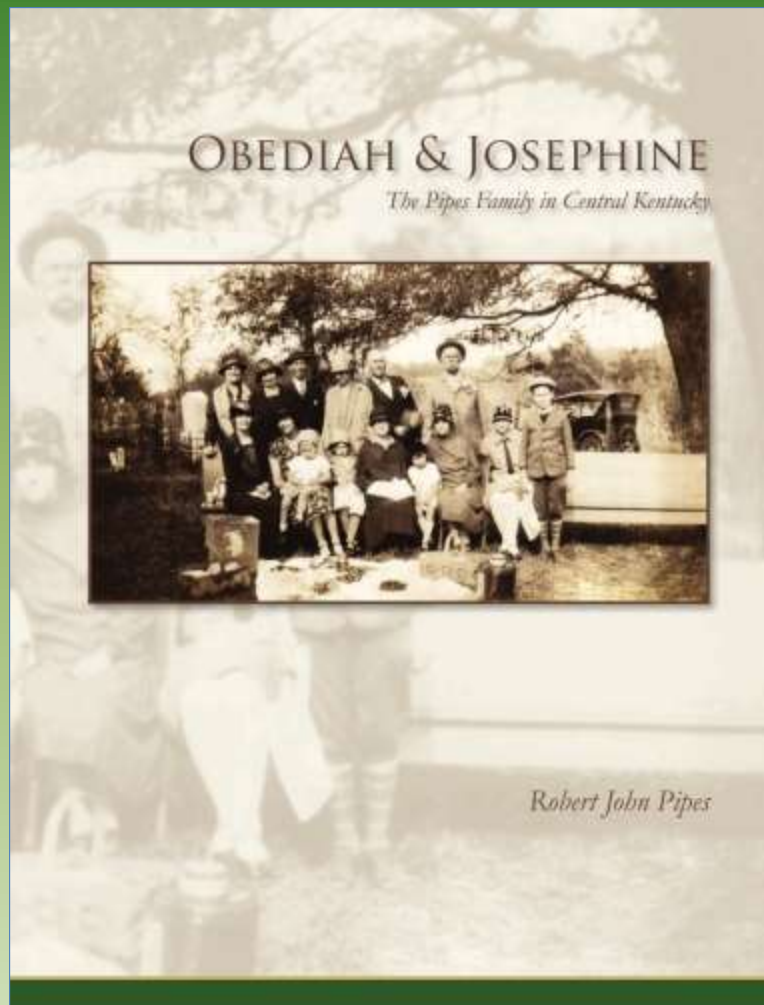

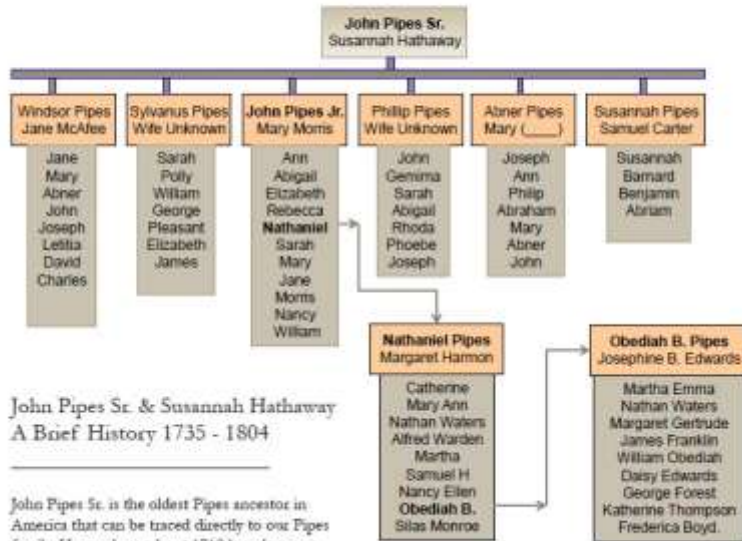

1. OBEDIAH'S ANCESTRY

Obediah Brumfield Pipes - His Pipes Family Origins in America



John Pipes Sr. & Susannah Hathaway A Brief History 1735 - 1804

John Pipes Sr. is the oldest Pipes ancestor in America that can be traced directly to our Pipes family. He was born about 1712 based on our current knowledge of his life events but we still do not know where he was born or exactly when he was born. The earliest record we have of him is his marriage by a Justice of the Peace named Sylvester Richmond on October 13, 1735 to Susannah Hathaway in Beikley, Bristol County, Massachusetts. There are a few other very brief mentions of men named Pipes in early American records going all the way back to 1655 but none of them seem to connect to our John Pipes Sr. There is work on-going to determine his parentage, but as of this writing, we do not know if he was born in Europe or in America.

His marriage to Susannah Hathaway in Massachusetts is a long life that included 9 children, three other colonies, several run-ins, and faint footsteps in the pages of

In 1736, Susannah's father, Abraham Hathaway, sold his property in Massachusetts, packed his belongings and started straight west for the colony of New Jersey and the Morristown area of Morris County. Some of his children eventually returned to Massachusetts but the younger children as well as John Pipes and his new bride made the decision to go with Abraham. The move may have been prompted by the opportunity to work in iron smelting. It was said you could find the iron ore on top of the ground.

Over the next 20 years John and Susannah had 5 sons and a daughter. (See the chart for the names, dates and spouses) and these 6 children form the basis for the entire history of the Pipes family in America. If your name is Pipes or you have Pipes in your ancestry and

John Pipes Jr. and Mary Morris A brief History 1777 - 1841

In August of 1777 the American Revolution was in full engagement, the outcome was clearly uncertain and the times unsettling for all the citizens of the colonies. John Pipes Jr. was a 38 year old widower, an infantry officer on leave from the Continental Army and was staying in Morris County, New Jersey. His father and his siblings had moved to North Carolina about 7 years earlier, his wife had passed away and he had 4 young children. We do not know how or when they met, but Mary Morris had an Uncle Joseph Morris who was also an officer in the New Jersey line and it may have been through him that they were introduced. She was about 16 or 17 years old that August when they were married in the First Presbyterian Church in Morristown and many years later she tells us about her wedding, her travels together from New Jersey to North Carolina and then on to Kentucky in a very complete Revolutionary War veterans widow's pension application that she submitted in 1836 in Mercer County, Kentucky.

John and Mary gave birth to 11 children from 1779 to 1803 and at least 64 grandchildren were born in the next generation. It is in her pension application that Mary tells us that John Jr. was in 16 battles during the war and that he resigned his commission in about 1779 or 80 and they moved to North Carolina to be closer to his father. They probably took the great wagon road south, stopped off near where the road meets the Yadkin River and headed a few miles west to Surry County, N. Carolina. They lived first on the south and then the north side of the Yadkin near the present day town of Elkin. Mary's father, Nathaniel Morris also came to Surry County about that same time and had farm property next to John Sr. on the south side of the river.

All together it appears that one of their children was born in New Jersey, six in N. Carolina and 4 in Kentucky. Our ancestor, Nathaniel Pipes, was born in 1888 in Surry County and made the trip through the Cumberland Gap when he was about 7 years old.

John and Mary purchased 36 acres of property in then Mercer County from James Bramfield in 1795, added more acreage a few years later and lived the rest of their lives about a half mile east of the Old Union Cemetery in the west end of present day Boyle County. (It became Boyle County in 1842.)

John passed away in 1821 at about 82 years old and Mary in 1841 at about 81. They are both resting in Old Union Cemetery and have a new stone marker that will last a long time.



This new stone monument was installed in 2010. It was made possible by generous donations from their descendants.

Introduction to the Edited and Expanded Version by Robert J. Pipes (2013)

This document detailing the actions of Obediah Pipes (My Great Grandfather) in the Civil War was sent to me some years ago (1998 to be exact) by the late Bob Russell with the understanding that I would publish it on my web site at pipesfamily.com. Howard Russell (the author) and I have both taken a detailed interest in the history of Obediah's involvement in the Civil War and I published a much abbreviated article about Obediah there, but with the promise to myself that some details and conflicts in the war account, which were known at the time that short article was written, would require more research and some difficult ironing out of the conflicts in the war records.

The records detailing those captures, transfers and prison rolls, are sometimes confusing and some are plainly contradictory but they make up the majority of his war records in the National Archives. Howard mentions those conflicts in his introduction and I also noted them many years ago when I first received copies of Obediah's war records from the National Archives.

At first I wrote them off as mistakes made in copying the records, which happened quite often. Then in 2007 I read the prison records and the actual details needed re-evaluation.

I obtained a copy of the book "Morgan's

is Coming" by Betty J. Gorin. In it, Mrs. Gorin details the battle of Tebb's Bend (Union) or the Battle of Green River Bridge (CSA). This battle takes place on July 4th 1863 in Campbellville, Kentucky and is only a few short miles from Obediah's Home in Boyle County. Mrs. Gorin's riveting account of the battle actions that day and the path of Morgan's Raiders as they continued on to Lebanon, Springfield, the Ohio River crossing and the "Great Raid", fired me up and more importantly, provided the clues to help unravel the mysterious conflicts in Obediah's war record.

Mrs. Gorin's book, combined with the Official Records, Basil Duke's History of Morgan's Raiders and Obediah's War records from the National Archives, suddenly came together for me, and to that end I have updated this account to include what I am convinced happened during that fateful and chaotic month of July, 1863.

There are also some details provided of the actions that Obediah was involved in during early March of 1863 when he was captured near Mt. Sterling, Ky. and found himself in prison for the first time.

Growing Up Years By William Hector Owens

My Parents - 1904-1908

William Leonard Owens and Katherine Thompson Pipes were married September 27, 1904. The wedding took place at the residence of Cousin Nannie Edwards Woodcock located at the corner of South Fourth and Dillehay streets in Danville, Kentucky. Mother was twenty one and father almost twenty nine. They went to the World Exposition at St. Louis, Missouri, on their honeymoon. They settled on a rented farm a short distance west of the Atoka Community and the Danville-Perryville Pike. My sister Sarah was born there October 17, 1905.

Otter Place - 1908-about 1910

Sometime in 1908, probably in early spring, my parents moved to the Otter place, a farm of some 60 acres owned by the Otter family of Danville. The land was located on the bluff of Dix River on the Danville-Lancaster Pike some seven miles from Danville. The house was fairly new and commodious. On August 23, 1909, I was born in the bedroom on the northwest corner of the ground floor. I was a plump baby weighing a little over nine pounds. A Dr. Rawson supervised my arrival into this world. I

was the first Owens grandson to appear, so I was named for my grandfather, William Hector Owens, making me William Hector II. I am told that I had a near fatal case of whooping cough at 6 or 8 weeks of age and at about one year had adenoid surgery. I was a fat baby, weighing 29 pounds at nine months. I suppose father attempted general farming and had a few cows. Once he told me of losing an Ayrshire cow that fell over the river bluff some 100 feet and died of a broken neck. Probably the family lived at the Otter farm about two years. The next move was to the Adams dairy.

Adams Dairy - about 1910-to 1913

Just a little beyond the junction of Alta Avenue and Old Wilderness Road (Stamford Pike) in Danville sits the Adams residence on the east side of the road. It is a very large structure that was built when was still a part of the Commonwealth of Virginia. In later years it was occupied by Miss who operated the facility as the Old Crow Inn. I think that the Crow title was derived

An Epilogue to the Life Of Margaret Gertrude Pipes

My grandmother, Margaret Gertrude Edwards Pipes Russell was a courageous, wonderful woman, and her house was the center of my world for several years.

She married my grandfather, James Robert Russell, (J.R.) on April 5, 1893, in Lincoln Co., KY. They had 11 children. Unfortunately, grandfather J.R. died June 29, 1927, in Reed City, MI, leaving grandmother to carry on without a husband and the family without a father.

They had moved from Kentucky, around 1900, first to Ohio for a short time, then into Tennessee, and by 1910, they had located in Anderson,

Indiana. J.R.'s mother, Adelia Peyton Russell Jarvis and her second husband, Will, as well as J.R.'s brother George who he was close to, were all living there at that time.

I was told by my Aunt Mabel, that J.R.'s doctor had recommended that he move to Michigan, where the air was clear and fresh. So they purchased a farm near Reed City, MI, with his gold watch, probably around 1915.

The farm was situated in the middle of the farmland region, with Reed City a long ride away by horse and buggy. Located 60 mi. offshore of Lake Michigan, the area was referred to as "The Sashings," accurately describing the harsh winter conditions that met them there. The weather was cold, with blinding snow during the freezing Michigan winters. Although the farm was large and lovely, with a two story Victorian style house, push button light switches, and with a creek "on the back 40," it was practically unfarmable. Because of early glaciers, the rock deposits were scattered everywhere, so Grandfather and his sons planted apple and maple trees, rather than field crops. They also had horses and a cow.

One time the farm almost burned down, due to sparks flying out of the chimney. While Grandparents J.R. and Gertrude were away at a prayer meeting, the roof caught fire.

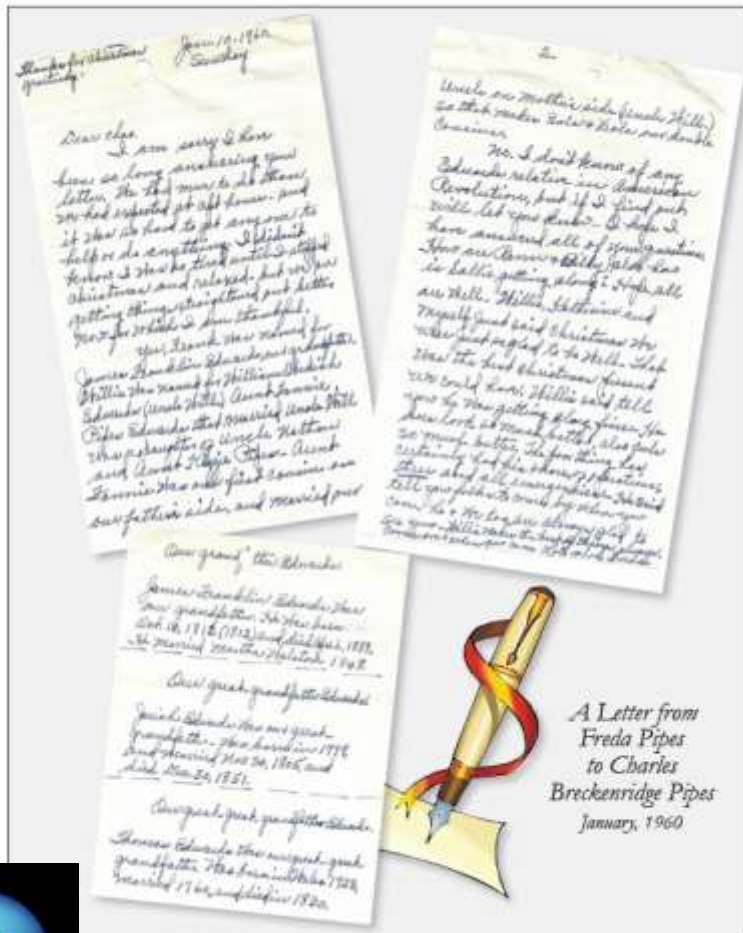
The boys had to run all the way down to the creek, and climb up and down the hill and ladders many times to put the fire out. Fortunately, young Tom and George had sense enough to put babies Mabel and Mary on the front lawn, where they were safe. Although the horses escaped, Tom and George were heroes!

According to family members, Grandfather J.R.'s personality was that of a natural born salesman, always coming up with new inventions, great stories and even magic tricks. He also played the banjo. His children, including nieces and nephews, loved it when he entertained them.

I retired from KSD after 30 years, where I taught in High School, served as a Supervising Teacher, and then in Public Relations and as Editor of the School magazine, The Kentucky Standard, published every month during the school year. Angerean and I took a trip to Yellowstone National Park on an Amtrak train across the country. He was a fan of trains, especially steam trains, and was a member of the Boyle County Gas & Steam Club. Two years after my retirement, my husband of 45 years died of complications of lung surgery, caused by chemicals in sprays and herbicides. Since then, I have stayed on the farm and have a good manager who takes care of the cattle and the haying, which are the only products we have. This is quite different from the days when we raised grains, hogs, sheep and chickens. For a period of time we had a dairy and sold first class milk. After selling the cows we started selling only beef calves which was much easier for my husband as help in the dairy was not good, and it eventually became necessary to upgrade the dairy which would have been costly.

Book S-W page 321 in 1869). He died on 9/29/1892 in Danville, Boyle Co., Kentucky, at age 57 (died of Bright's disease. His Obit appeared in the Oct 11th 1892 Issue of the Stanford Interior Journal, Lincoln Co., Kentucky).¹ He was buried on 9/30/1892 in Old Union Cemetery, Boyle Co., Kentucky.²

Children of Obediah Brumfield Pipes and Josephine Bonaparte Edwards: all born in Washington Co., Kentucky, were as follows:

1. **i. MARTHA EMMA³** was born on 1/28/1870. She married Jefferson Deacon Polk, son of Dr. William Tod Polk and Margaret Binscoe, on 12/24/1896. She died on 11/15/1935 at age 65. She was buried on 11/17/1935.
2. **ii. NATHAN WATERS** was born on 11/27/1871. He married Salie Honaker on 3/18/1907. He died on 8/19/1914 at age 42.
3. **iii. MARGARET GERTRUDE** was born on 11/9/1874. She married James Robert Russell on 4/5/1893 in Boyle Co., Kentucky. She died on 10/23/1955 at age 80.
4. **iv. JAMES FRANKLIN** was born on 7/21/1876. He married Florence May Rains, daughter of Harvey Rains and Louisa Baser, on 9/20/1912 in Indianapolis, Indiana. He died on 3/18/1945 at age 68. He was buried on 3/22/1945.
5. **v. WILLIAM OBEDIAH** was born on 5/4/1878. He married Mary McKeon on 12/6/1908 in Indianapolis, Indiana. He died on 2/3/1960 at age 81. He was buried on 2/5/1960.
6. **vi. DARY ERTSMAN** was born on 9/2/1879. She married Harry H. Poston on 12/3/1921 in Danville, Kentucky. She died on 4/29/1946 in Danville, Kentucky, at age 66. She was buried on 5/2/1946 in Bellvue Cemetery, Danville, Boyle Co., Kentucky.
They had no children.
7. **vii. GEORGE FOREST** was born on 10/22/1881.
George Forest left Kentucky in 1901 and traveled to Wichita, Kansas with the intent to join the Army. He enlisted in Wichita in 1901 and was sent to Fort Russell in Wyoming for training. He was assigned to an Artillery company and then the 13th Infantry unit and served in the Philippine insurrection. He returned to the US and was discharged at Angel Island, California in Dec. of 1904. He was never heard from again by his relatives in Kentucky. His sister Frieda made many attempts to locate him with no success. I have searched death records and census records but have found no trace of him.
8. **viii. KATHERINE THOMPSON** was born on 3/24/1883. She married William Leonidas Owen on 9/27/1904. She died on 6/12/1975 at age 92. She was buried on 6/15/1975.
9. **ix. FREDERICKA BOYD** was born on 4/4/1885. She died on 1/22/1969 in Boyle Co., Kentucky, at age 83. She was buried on 1/25/1969 in Bellvue Cemetery, Danville, Boyle Co., Kentucky.
Frieda never married and had no children.

GENERATION TWO

1. **MARTHA EMMA³ PIPES** (Obediah) was born on 1/28/1870 in Washington Co., Kentucky. She married Jefferson Deacon Polk, son of Dr. William Tod Polk and Margaret Binscoe, on 12/24/1896. She died on 11/15/1935 in Mason Co., Kentucky, at age 65.³ She was buried on 11/17/1935 in Hillcrest Cemetery, Perryville, Boyle Co., Kentucky.
Emma was known by her middle name "Emma". Emma and Jefferson had 5 children but only 4 survived. They lived on a farm near Pleasant Run and later in North Lebanon in Mason Co. and show up there in the 1900 thru 1920 census. She died as being a blacksmith in the 1900 census but her death cert says he was a Veterinarian for 30 years.
